Law and Order IS a Major Issue

As the facts of Chicago finally become known, the majority stand against the Chicago police becomes more and more unjustified. According to various news media, press releases, charging Chicago police with brutality, were prepared by anti-war demonstration leaders three weeks before the actual confrontations between the demonstrators and authorities.

Harmless peace demonstrators? Isn't it amazing what certain leaders had to say about the "defenseless" peace demonstrators whom they have so often termed filthy, downtrodden examples of a failure to face reality? Are these the same leaders who say the key to law and order is respect for the law and what it stands for? It would seem that policemen might accidentally have the same inalienable rights guaranteed by the constitution of the United States to "citizens". Some people don't seem to think so. They seem to believe that if a group of people want, first, to demonstrate without a permit, and, secondly, to sit down in the middle of one of our largest city's main intersections, it's all right. They don't see why the policemen, after repeatedly asking the demonstrators to disperse from the intersection and after using tear gas in vain, had to resort to military tactics. But maybe they didn't know about the repeated requests and use of tear gas. Why? Because the networks they were watching were not showing the numerous attempts to disperse the group peacefully. The televisions were not showing the bricks, bottles, projectiles, and as a U. S. NEWS reporter put it, "unprintable four letter words" thrown at the policemen. Networks didn't mention that these mob gatherings could have left the group, instead of defiantly remaining. The same network commentators and reporters say we are living in a "sick" society, a society in which violence is sensationalized. Mention the three major networks, and I'll mention three major networks who, that night, made this society sick by sensationalizing violence.

As the political leaders propose their solutions for the problems of law and order, two proposals are brought to mind: 1) that they themselves somehow instill into their own personalities and the personalities of their comrades, respect for the law and what it stands for; 2) that the major networks examine their contributions to the breakdown in law and order and the respect due to the law.

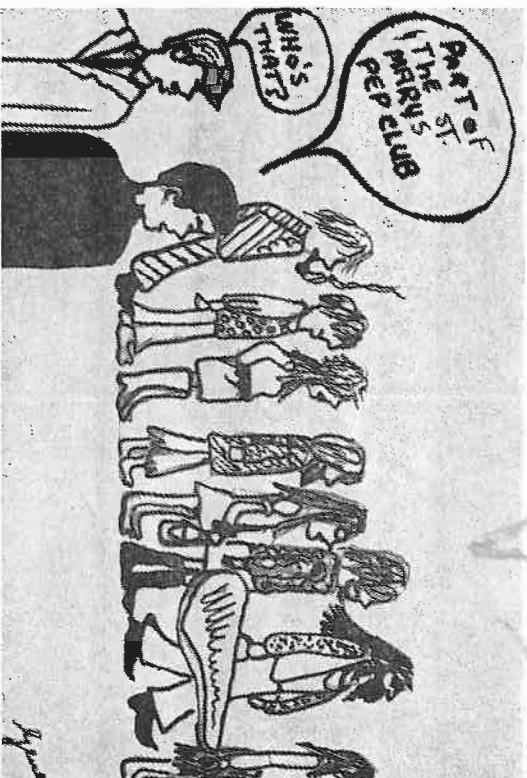

Who Did What?

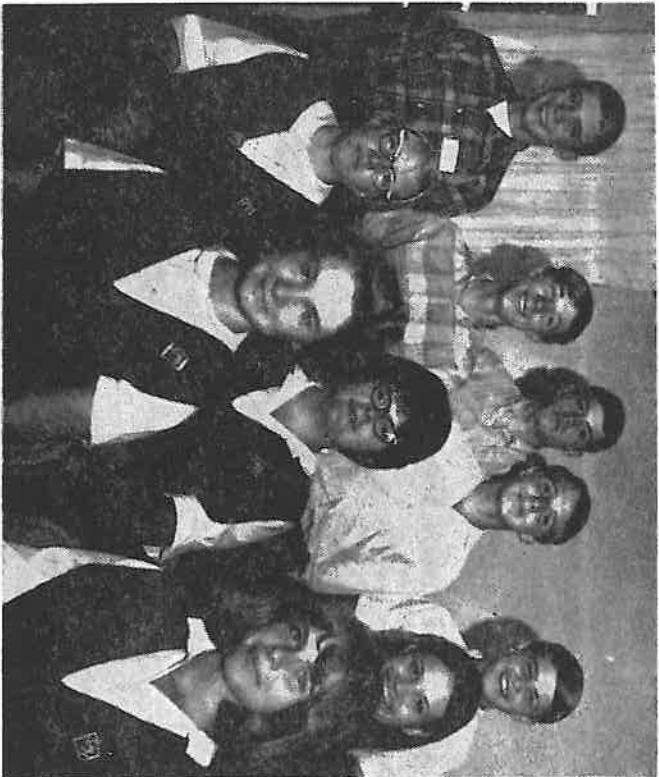

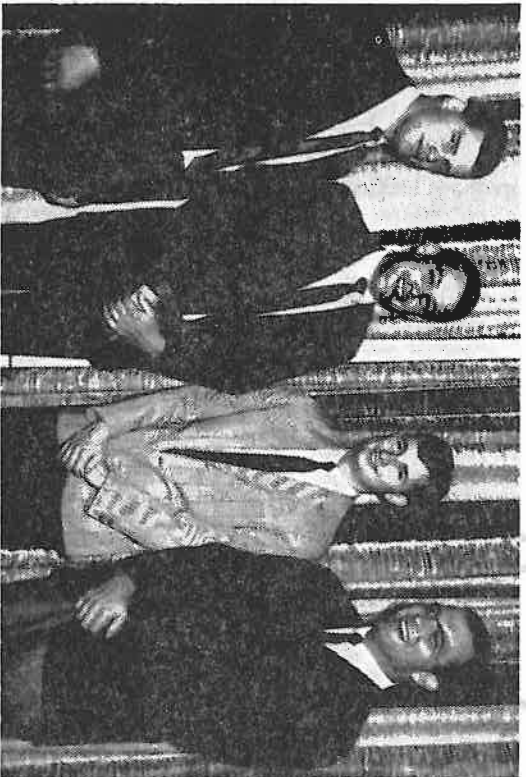

He spent sixteen months of this time in Freidburg, Germany. Still a bachelor, Mr. Wells future goal is to teach history and to become head football and track coach in a large school system. At St. Mary's he teaches World Problems, English, Speech; he is assistant football coach and head track coach.

Mr. Lee Knepper, born in 1944 in Theford, Nebraska, is a graduate of Theford High School. PLANET OF THE APES Movie Is Reviewed

"The monkey", said Henry Ward Beecher, "is an organized sarcasm upon the human race." But this idea is reversed in this film about a space odyssey that goes awry and crash lands four astronauts on an unknown planet. The astronauts have been traveling for about 2,000 years, but their spaceship has been zooming along almost at the speed of light, and so, in accordance with Einstein's Time-Dilation Theory, they have scarcely aged.

At first all they find is sand, but soon they stumble across a primitive tribe of mute cave people who are periodically rounded up by the rulers (monkeys) of the planet to be used for laboratory experiments or to be put into the local zoo.

One of the astronauts is killed while the other receives a skull fracture and loses his mind. Charlton Heston, the leader, is soon captured. Aided by two chimpanzee scientists, he eventually makes his escape into forbidden land where no monkey has ever set foot. There he learns the dreadful secret of why evolution has been reversed and why monkeys, not men, rule this earthlike planet.

This film has much to say, but the script is cluttered with man-monkey analogies which are quite crude and cony. A few of these are "Human see; human do. I never met an ape I didn't like." He was a gorilla to remember." I think the point of this film is that man must change his ways; he most certainly needs to be different. But more appealing? I think this is a step in the wrong direction.

Cardinals Soar High Early In Season

Friday The 13th Proves Disastrous to Creighton

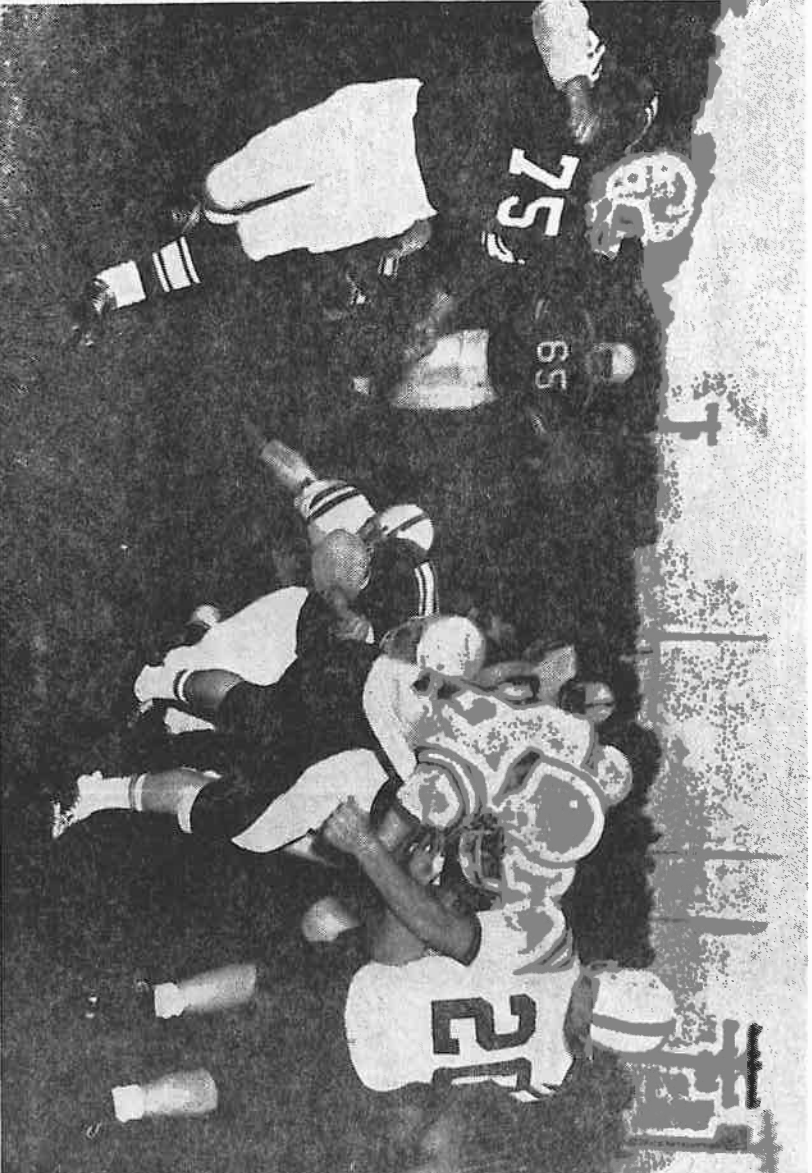
St. Mary's Cardinals unleashed a vigorous attack Friday to down Creighton 45 - 20. Led by Ted Fritton, Jed Wolfe, Mark Tharnish and Tom Earley, the Cards piled up a 31 - 7 halftime lead, and coasted the rest of the way with Wolfe scoring in the 3rd and Tharnish in the 4th.

St. Mary's was never seriously threatened throughout the game, although the Cards seemed a bit worried when Kelley of Creighton unbound for a 90-yard touchdown run in the middle of the first quarter.

Pat Gleason completed 5 of 7 passes for 113 yards. This includes a 25 yard pass to Tharnish in the 2nd quarter and a 16 yard one to Tharnish in the 4th.

Jed Wolfe, displaying good speed, scampered 65 yards for a touchdown in the 3rd quarter. Other scores include Tom Earley on an 8 yard run in the first, and Ted Fritton on 3 yard runs in the first and second quarters.

St. Mary's Plucks Lynch Eagles 27-0

A powerful Cardinal running attack, paced by Tom Earley, who covered 165 yards in 20 carries, proved too much for the Lynch Eagles Friday, September 20, as the Cardinals defeated them 27-0.

Earley started the Cards off to a great beginning in the first minutes of play with a 56 yard touchdown run. He followed in the 3rd period with a one-yard score, and Fritton plunged through from 7 yards out for a touchdown also.

The final score came in the 4th with a 26 yard run by Tom Wolfe. The Cards' defense held the Eagles to a -13 yards on the ground while St. Mary's rolled up 325 yards rushing. Leading punt returner for the Cards was Greg Hoffman who averaged 15.5 yards in 6 returns. St. Mary's completely dominated the game, controlling the ball for 63 plays compared with the Eagles' 33.

Pass protection was poor."

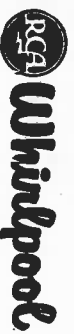
